

What do you do with an idea? SWCS, CISA and IWC co-host Irregular Warfare Forum

he U.S. Army John F. Kennedy Special Warfare Center and School (SWCS) in collaboration with National Defense University's College of International Security Affairs (CISA), and the Irregular Warfare Center hosted the Spring Symposium Irregular Warfare (IW) Forum on the SWCS campus at Fort

Liberty, North Carolina, May 15-17.

Faculty and Chief of Curriculum, conducted a workshop to validate the IWC's newly proposed curriculum map for the online 101-401 series. With a positive reception among the workshop's attendees, the curriculum map sets the framework that was started in IW 101 and will continue in 201-401's development.

"The Irregular Warfare Forum at Fort Liberty was a fantastic venue for us to be able to discuss current and future IWC curricula plans, and get valuable feedback from the irregular warfare community of interest," said Gardner.

The theme for this symposium was "What do you do with an idea?"

Brig. Gen. Guillaume "Will" Beaurpere, SWCS commanding general, introduced the topic to the symposium and posed his thoughts to the crowd, "What do you do with an idea? You think about it, you debate it, and you write about it so others may learn."

The Spring Symposium IW Forum focuses on developments in education, research, and practice relevant to irregular warfare. The symposium featured CISA student research presentations, connecting current research with the community of interest and practitioners.

Forty-six CISA students representing the U.S. Army, U.S. Air Force, U.S. State Department, and foreign partner students from Egypt, Germany, Iraq, the Netherlands, Romania, and Thailand presented their thesis to research panels.

Irregular warfare is not unique to special operations or the U.S. military. It is a combined effort focused on partnerships, including the Department of Defense, interagency services, and our global allies and partners.

"The Spring Symposium IW Forum served as a critically important venue to improve our joint force and whole-of-government understanding in how the U.S., along with our allies and partners, can work together for mutual advantage in strategic competition," said Lt. Col. Tim Murphy, Director, U.S. Army Irregular Warfare Proponent at SWCS.

"As SWCS continues to develop the IW Academy at our Fort Liberty Campus, collaboration with IW professionals across the Services, Interagency, industry, and our foreign partners will be paramount to developing IW Doctrine, Training, Leader Development, and Education to ensure the joint force is equally capable of executing both irregular and conventional warfare," Murphy added.


Beaurpere's opening remarks set the expectations for the research presented and for the debates within the research panels.

"Your research matters," he said. "Take what you've learned back to your units in the operational force. Be open, flexible, and curious."

The first day, research panels discussed diverse academic aspects of Resilience - Resistance - Disruption, Utilizing and Adapting SOF for Strategic Competition, Africa and Strategic Competition, Developments in Irregular Warfare and the Gray Zone, Networks-Influence- Identity, Regional Dynamics in the Middle East and Asia, and Chinese Influence in the Western Hemisphere.

The second day, research panels Societal Dynamics and the Security Environment, Influence, Competing Across Dimensions, and Challenges in the Indo-Pacific.

The third day's discussion panel included the way ahead strategy for IW and standing up the IW Academy as part of the SWCS campus.

Unlocking the Potential of the IW Global Network: Building a Resilient Future

Solving wicked problems such as irregular warfare requires an adaptive approach. It demands that we challenge conventional thinking, embrace complexity, and unite diverse perspectives in pursuit of innovative solutions.

It was to this end that the IW Clobal Network was shaped, but what's the story behind its creation and just how much untapped potential does it harbor?

The IW Global Network was created with a clear purpose to address the increasingly complex and interconnected nature of IW challenges. In today's world, addressing irregular challenges requires a coordinated and agile response from nations, organizations, and individuals alike. The IW Global Network is meant to serve as a catalyst for cooperation, knowledge-sharing, and innovation in the realm of irregular warfare, bringing together stakeholders from diverse backgrounds to collectively tackle common threats and seize opportunities.

At its most basic, human networks embody interconnectedness among individuals, communities, and organizations, forming a foundation of resilience and solidarity. They thrive in everyday interactions, from neighbors lending a hand to colleagues sharing expertise, empowering individuals in ways unattainable alone. Networks provide the ability to leverage collective knowledge, resources, and creativity to address irregular challenges and seize opportunities. Their diverse and decentralized nature allows for innovative solutions and real-time adaptation to emerging challenges. This collective of intelligence and agility enables human networks to effectively address unforeseen problems, drawing upon the strengths of their members.

"In the realm of irregular warfare, where adversaries operate in the shadows and traditional boundaries dissolve, networks act as indispensable architects of resilience and agility," said Dr. Dennis Walters, IWC Director (Acting).

Expanding on this foundational understanding, historical instances demonstrate how networks acted as amplifying elements. During World War II, the French Resistance showcased the emergence of a decentralized network in France, dedicated to undermining German occupation. Similarly, the Yugoslav Partisans established a resistance network against German and Italian forces, uniting fighters across Yugoslavia from diverse ethnic backgrounds and political ideologies.

Al-Qaeda leveraged a global network of operatives, sympathizers, and affiliates. Through decentralized cells operating in multiple countries, they coordinated terrorist activities, disseminated propaganda, and recruited new members, posing a significant challenge to counterterrorism efforts worldwide. The Underground Railroad stands as another testament to the potency of human networks, operating as a decentralized network across multiple states and regions, aiding those seeking freedom. These examples serve as illustrations to demonstrate the potential achievements that can be realized through effective network utilization. One thing is certain, IW requires collaboration, and the broader your network, the more effective your efforts will be.

The IW Global Network falls in line with one of the IWC's primary endeavors of fostering a global, collaborative, IW community. To further enhance collaboration, the IW Global Network is broken down into smaller Functional Area Networks (FANs), with each FAN assigned a specific IW area. New FANs continuously arise as the community identifies needs, and the IWC expands its efforts to encompass additional areas of focus. This adaptive approach ensures that the FANs remain responsive to evolving irregular challenges. FANs aim to foster a cohesive effort across the Department of Defense (DoD), Interagency (IA), private sector, and global partners. This collective approach aims to maximize IW capabilities and ensure a comprehensive whole-of-government response to irregular challenges. The IWC's role is to act as a conductor, orchestrating these intricate connections that span the globe. The Center's role goes beyond just managing networks; it's about empowering collaboration, fostering resilience, and navigating the complexities of the irregular challenges the world is facing.

Four Years of Growth and Impact: The Irregular Warfare Initiative
