With a foreword penned by LTG(R) Michael Nagata, the book assesses the evolution of trends in irregular warfare and strategic competition, with vignettes on lawfare, economic warfare, maritime gray zone activities, climate change, and more.


this valuable resource as a way to bolster awareness and knowledge on many different facets of IW while helping to broaden our organizational outreach and inspire future IW scholars and practitioners."

The book fills an important gap in existing literature on irregular warfare (IW). Much has been written about the current state of play in strategic competition and IW, but there remains a dearth of academic literature on how current IW trends can evolve, and how future IW trends could emerge. The IWC set out to fill that gap, assembling a diverse set of authors and topics.

The IWC is particularly grateful for the practitioners and scholars that contributed such rich and thought-provoking chapters for our inaugural book. Participating authors came from the private sector; DoD Regional Centers, including the Daniel K. Inouye Asia Pacific Center for Security Studies and the George C. Creeting from the IWC

The summer months have been busy at the IWC as we continue to synchronize efforts across the U.S. government and abroad with our partners and allies. I've tried to capture some of the more notable accomplishments from the past month from both our Center as well as other organizations in the IW family.

First, we finally published our first organizational book, "The Future Face of Irregular Warfare: Great Power Confrontation in the 21st Century." We learned a great deal about the publishing process within the U.S. government to say the least. This book is an edited volume of essays on the future evolutions and trends of irregular warfare and competition. Written by leading scholars and practitioners of irregular warfare and national security, the book presents a forward-leaning analysis of how IW between the U.S. and its competitors is likely to play out in several key theaters, such as the Indo-Pacific and the Baltics, and in particular issue sets, such as climate change, misinformation and disinformation, economic coercion, and counterterrorism. During my recent travels, I had the pleasure to co-host the Ridge Runner Irregular Warfare Exercise Distinguished Visitor Days held July 24-25, 2024, at Camp Dawson in Kingwood, West Virginia. This event, which was preceded by an IWC irregular warfare academics program of instruction, provided an opportunity to observe U.S. and international participants of the exercise being held throughout West Virginia and South Carolina July 9 - 27, 2024.

The Ridge Runner Irregular Warfare Exercise is a West Virginia National Guard-led, multinational IW exercise that provides a training platform for A. Co., 2/19th Special Forces Group (Airborne), elements of the 92nd Civil Affairs Battalion, U.S.M.C. forces, and elements of the 130th Airlift Wing and 167th Aeromedical Evacuation Squadron. The Ridge Runner Irregular Warfare exercise provides a dynamic and realistic platform for allies and partners to conduct irregular warfare training, develop interoperability, and enable training to enhance strategic IW capabilities. Seeing the 'battle-lab' proof of concepts happen in real time is truly rewarding.

The Center's team has been working diligently in planning several future events to help showcase the Center's mission and capabilities while supporting our allies and partners in all things irregular warfare related. Check out our upcoming events including our partnership with the Foreign Policy Research Institute's (FPRI) Center for the Study of Intelligence and Nontraditional Warfare for the upcoming IW GWOT Lessons Learned since 9/11 event Sept. 17-18 as well as our second annual colloquium in Sept. 26-27 and Intel Conference slated for Oct. 29-31 in Annapolis, Md.

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The Center and FPRI to Host Conference Emphasizing IW Lessons Learned Since 9/11

The Department of Defense's Irregular Warfare Center (IWC) and the Foreign Policy Research Institute's (FPRI) Center for the Study of Intelligence and Nontraditional Warfare will co-host a two-day conference on September 17 and 18, 2024, to discuss irregular warfare lessons learned since 9/11 at the U.S. Naval Institute Jack C. Taylor Conference Center, Annapolis, Maryland.

The conference aims to capture lessons learned, including positive and negatives examples, in the conduct of irregular warfare operations around the world by U.S., allied, and partner nations and non-state actors after the terrorist attacks of 9/11.

While Afghanistan and Iraq were the most prominent of the post-9/11 wars, the conference welcomes papers that draw on lessons learned from irregular warfare operations in the Philippines, Horn of Africa, the Sahel region of

"We are excited to partner with FPRI for this critical, informative event to provide an opportunity to discuss some of the IW lessons learned since 9/11 while fostering growth and emphasizing the importance of learnin<mark>g from pas</mark>t experiences to find solutions to future irregular problems," said Lori Leffler, IWC Deputy Director and Chief of Staff. "The tremendous value this event brings through the insights shared by panel members, practitioners, presenters and IW SMEs aims to aid the future of irregular warfare.

"IWC and FPRI's Center for the Study of Intelligence and Nontraditional Warfare are happy to have the chance to collaborate on this project and to bring together both academic and governmental views and approaches towards studying this important topic," said Phil Wasielewski, Senior Fellow, Foreign Policy Research Institute Director, Center for the Study of Intelligence and Nontraditional Warfare. "The purpose of the conference is not only to collect lessons learned from our post-9/11 irregular wars (Afghanistan, Iraq, Horn of Africa, Sahel, Philippines, etc.) but also to highlight the continuing need to study and examine irregular warfare operations while much of the DoD budget and educational centers have been reoriented to conventional war against "peer competitors."

"We see this conference not as a "one and done" event but as the first step for both of our recently new centers to catalyze interest in studying irregular warfare and avoithe boom-or-bust cycle that has plagued it in DoD and the academic world since WWII," added Wasielewski. "The IWC has plans to collect all papers in their own databases and FPRI plans to publish select papers on its website. Submissions should $\,$ describe lessons learned from one of seven conference topics: Information Operations; Human Terrain; Logistics, Supply, and Maintenance Operations; Medical, Dental, and Veterinary Operations; Intelligence and Counterintelligence Activities; Engaging with Partner Forces; and Utilizing Local Police and Militia Forces in a Counterinsurgency.

The conference hosts particularly welcome:

- Case studies from specific campaigns (i.e. The Al Anbar Awakening) or programs (i.e. Village Stability Operations/Afghan Local Police) that cover one or more of these
- · Lessons learned from lesser-known campaigns in the Philippines, Horn of Africa, Sahel, or elsewhere:
- Papers that provide allied, partner force, and indigenous perspectives of the confer-

Authors of papers chosen by IWC and FPRI will be invited to present their papers at the conference either in-person or virtually. Selected papers may also be published by FPRI's Center for the Study of Intelligence and Nontraditional Warfare on their

Wasielewski added, "The value this conference will bring is that there will be both a number of papers presented on various aspects of irregular warfare that are sure to be treasure troves of useful lessons learned but also a number of panels with very experienced participants from the various post-9/11 irregular warfare operations around the world. The insights they will share during the conference will be equally valuable and are worth preserving for the next time our national defense establishment is called upon to conduct an irregular warfare campaign."

The Irregular Warfare Center and Hybrid CoE Cooperation: A Vital Partnership for the Future

The Irregular Warfare Center (IWC) and the European Center of Excellence for Countering Hybrid Threats (HCOE) entered into a unique partnership in FY 24 making both institutions stronger and more globally connected. The HCOE was born out of a desire to strengthen NATO-EU cooperation on hybrid threats with the 2016 Joint NATO/EU declaration committing both institutions to counter hybrid threats in a cooperative manner. In this declaration, NATO and the EU voiced the realization that hybrid threats exploited the divisions between civil and military responses. Success in countering these threats requires combining individual strengths and areas of expertise. Finland answered the call in 2017 by creating the HCOE and, to date, 36 NATO Allies and EU Member States have become members of the Center.

Similarly, the $\overline{\text{IWC}}$ was stood up by Congress in FY 23 to serve as a functional center with a distinct mission, expanding IW knowledge and capabilities globally. Its mandate includes three elements necessary to develop creative solutions to irregular problems: funding, authority, and expertise. These elements provide the framework for the IWC to examine challenges and offer solutions in multiple irregular arenas. Its funding provides a structure to study the current environment and recommend solutions. Its authority allows the Center to convene stakeholders from the U.S. Government, including the Defense Department and interagency, international partners, and academia. Lastly, the IWC's expertise guides stakeholders through investigating, developing, and delivering sustainable processes and programs. Its mission and mandate separate the IWC from the regional centers that operate geographically to support regional combatant commands and partners.
